## Somerset County Government is Here to Serve You












Somerset County's government serves over 345,000 residents in 21 municipalities. The county is governed by a Board of County Commissioners of five members elected countywide. In January, the Commissioners elect one member to be Commissioner Director and another to be Deputy Director.

The Board of County Commissioners holds regular public meetings on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month in the County Administration Building at 20 Grove Street, Somerville. Regular meetings start immediately following the 5:00 pm agenda session and are streamed live on the County website and Facebook page. Items discussed at each agenda session will be voted on at the next regular meeting that occurs two or three weeks later.

Three other elected officials serve the people of Somerset County. The County Clerk is responsible for recordkeeping for real estate, businesses, and elections; and for receiving election petitions, designing election ballots, and certifying election results, among other functions.

The County Sheriff provides security at the Somerset County Courthouse and the County Complex; operates the Somerset County Jail; transports County prisoners; and is responsible for Sheriff's Sales, a K-9 Unit, and the execution of civil and criminal court warrants, among other duties.

The County Surrogate probates wills; qualifies executors, administrators, and trustees; and issues necessary documents for administering estates.

#### **Mobile Outreach Van to Bring Services to Communities**



Somerset County's Human Services Department in May is launching a new Somerset HELPS mobile outreach van intended to bring services directly to neighborhoods in need of support.

"This program can have an enormous impact on underserved communities," said Somerset County Commissioner Paul M. Drake, liaison to the Human Services Department. "It recognizes that many people in need struggle with transportation to get to our Human Services headquarters in Somerville. We will now bring services to people in need."

The program is funded by Somerset County Board of County Commissioners through the Human Services Department and from the Opioid Settlement Fund. The Sheriff's office is contributing staff time in the form of a deputy who will drive the van, which will include bilingual staff.

At the beginning, The Somerset HELPS van will be on the road about one day per week and will announce its schedule one month in advance. It will also attend major events, such as the 4-H Fair in August.



## Surrogate Jalloh Launches Online Probate Filing

The loss of a loved one can be extremely difficult, especially for family members who serve as Executor of the will or administrator of the estate. Somerset County Surrogate Bernice "Tina" Jalloh understands how hard it can be to juggle work, funeral arrangements, family obligations as well as one's own grief, and is committed to simplifying the process for all.

Beginning this spring, executors can submit probate information such as death certificates, wills, and information on family and beneficiaries online, removing the need for an initial in-person trip to the Surrogate's office in Somerville. The online service means executors/administrators can submit the information in a timely manner even if they do not live locally themselves, saving time and expense.

### Guided Trail Rides Return to Lord Stirling Park



The Somerset County Park Commission and Board of County Commissioners announced the restoration of staff-guided trail rides at the Stable at Lord Stirling Park in Basking Ridge following the acquisition of six new horses. The return of Park Commission owned horses is part of the two-year effort during COVID to restore the Stable to self-sufficiency while expanding equestrian program access to all residents.

#### Somerset County Municipalities are "Film Ready!"

The New Jersey Motion Picture and Television Commission named four Somerset County municipalities as the first in the state to be "film ready." Franklin, Hillsborough, South Bound Brook, and Watchung are the first members of New Jersey's Film Ready Communities program.

The program takes advantage of the state's exploding video production industry and the economic benefits that come with filmmaking. These towns demonstrated they have locations, expertise, and resources to support video shoots. The Somerset County Commissioners launched the Somerset County Film Commission in 2021 to take advantage of the state's generous tax credit program for video productions.

"Somerset County is pleased to provide New Jersey's inaugural class of Film Ready Communities, demonstrating the fantastic opportunities offered by our diverse filming locations, local businesses, and proximity to major cities and transportation hubs," said Somerset County Commissioner Director Shanel Y. Robinson.

#### **Somerset County Promotes Tourism Through Sports**

More than 3,000 families traveling from 17 states will be staying in Somerset County hotels July 6-8 this summer thanks to the Top Threat girl's lacrosse tournament that is being made possible, in part, by an American Rescue Plan grant of \$53,000 through the Somerset County Commissioners.

The event will be held at Iron Peak Sports in Hillsborough, with participants staying throughout the county. "We're now fully booked for that weekend," said Roland Mracek, the Director of Sales at the Hyatt House in Bridgewater. He said 80 of 128 suites were booked for the tournament.

"We're very focused on supporting agritourism, heritage tourism, and sports tourism to replace business travel lost since the pandemic," said Somerset County Commissioner Melonie Marano.



#### County Invests \$3 Million in Next Generation Jobs at RVCC

The Somerset County Board of County Commissioners allocated \$3 million in American Rescue Plan funding to Raritan Valley Community College (RVCC) to expand workforce training to help students secure next-generation technology jobs. The allocation will help RVCC continue its advanced manufacturing leadership and support the County's vibrant high-tech industries.
