III. Presentation from McKinney-Vento Region 1-Bernadette Noll, M.Ed.

Supporting Multilingual Learners: The New American Population

- Goal: to eliminate barriers to education for temporarily housed children so they have the same educational opportunities as their permanently housed peers.
- Facts About McKinney-Vento

- O Supports HUD definition of Homeless and/or any child who is lacking a fixed, regular, & adequate nighttime residence
- o Every county has a liaison
- o Every school district in the United States has liaisons. Contact State Coordinators for Support
- o Somerset County is part of Region I McKinney-Vento (click here for our website)
- o Bergen County Special Services was awarded the grant for the past 30 years to support McKinney-Vento work in our region
- A Note on Doubling Up
 - o They may view the situation as not temporary as they see themselves "living there for a while until they can find a place due to the initial displacement," yet be MKV eligible due to being displaced and not realizing that doubling up is considered homeless.

IV. Human Services Director's Report – Mike Frost

- State budget address transcript is available.
- Sarah Adelman, Human Services Commissioner held an address on 2/27/2024
 - \$20 million for continued expansion of the Arrive Together program. Screeners paired with local police in designated counties. Under the direction of the county prosecutor's office. This program is fully function in Franklin and will be rolling out in North Plainfield.
 - o \$100 million for Cover All Kids Medicaid expansion
 - o \$4.1 million increase for day rate for hotels for sheltering raises from \$62 to \$72
 - o \$12 million toward increasing income eligibility for the parent and senior gold pharmaceuticals system programs
 - o \$6 million to annualize the \$95 SNAP minimum benefit
 - o Additional funding for mental health provider loan forgiveness
 - o Improved access to deaf and hard of hearing mostly through the installation of hearing induction loops
- DCF meeting last month had a presentation from Keving Donahue on 211
 - o NJ 211 has revamped their website
 - o Can update provider information
 - o We do not have enough resources in the county
- Somerset County does not have a full county shelter. Those seeking shelter can be brought to the Board of Social Services. However, after 4:30 pm they must call NJ 211.
 - o Office On Emergency Manager, Board of Social Service and Human Services are working together to create a better system
 - o Considering the faith-based network for assistance
 - o No number to call between 4:30 pm and 6:30 pm.
- Discussions about food insecurity. Major issue for the state and County Administrator.
- Mental Health Administrator position posted.
- The county budget has not been approved yet. Hoping for April

VI. Committee Reports

Executive Committee- Rheanah Johnson

Regarding our efforts surrounding immigrant youth mental health, the executive committee met with Church World Service (CWS) on February 5, 2024. CWS is a faith-based organization transforming communities around the globe through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement, and disaster. They provide support services to refugees, special immigrant visa holders, unaccompanied minors, and other eligible Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) populations. Reported Trends

- Unaccompanied minors
 - o Majority of the youth are ages 13-17
 - o Reunification and attachment are a challenge because of the distance between guardians and youth
 - o Trauma from the journey of migrating
- No substance abuse
- Vulnerability to exploitation
 - o Inability to work due to documentation
- Stress from mixed status families
- Lack of education due to cultural norms
- Linguistic and cultural isolation
 - o Some youth do not speak the main language of their country
- Violence is the first mode of response for some younger children (i.e., Afghan and Syrian)
- LGBTQ youth seeking services

We will continue gathering information from various organizations.
