The Open Space Trust Fund tax levy will terminate on December 31, 2017, saving all taxpayers four cents (\$0.04) per one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of assessed value. It is estimated that after retiring all remaining Open Space Debt obligations in 2017, there will be a balance of approximately \$1,100,000.00 in the fund. The Township has identified a need for park infrastructure improvements which include the installation of artificial turf on existing or new athletic fields and related maintenance of its lands acquired for recreation. This proposed amendment would permit the Township to utilize the estimated balance of the Township's Open Space Trust Fund to pay for such improvements and maintenance expenses. 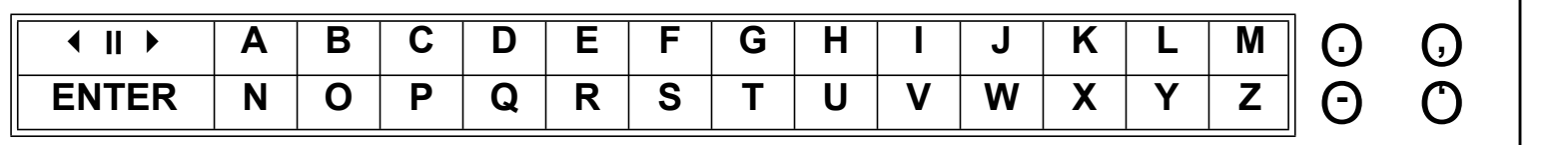

The Green Acres program also helps pay for improvements to parks.</p>	<p>INTERPRETIVE STATEMENT</p> <p>If this question is approved by the voters, the Borough will use approximately \$1,000,000 on a one-time basis from the approximately \$5,600,000 which is currently in the open space trust. None of the money currently in the Fund that is designated for development (approximately \$470,000) will be used for this one time expenditure. By utilizing the money that is currently in the Borough's open space trust fund, the Borough will avoid the significant costs associated with borrowing money to construct a turf field. Those costs include costs of issuance of bonds and bond anticipation notes, as well as interest over the estimated 10 year useful life of the turf field. The Borough continues to collect approximately \$450,000 in open space trust funds every year. After this money is appropriated on a one-time basis, the monies remaining in the Borough Open Space Trust Fund will only be able to be used in accordance with the terms set forth in the 1998 and 2008 public questions. 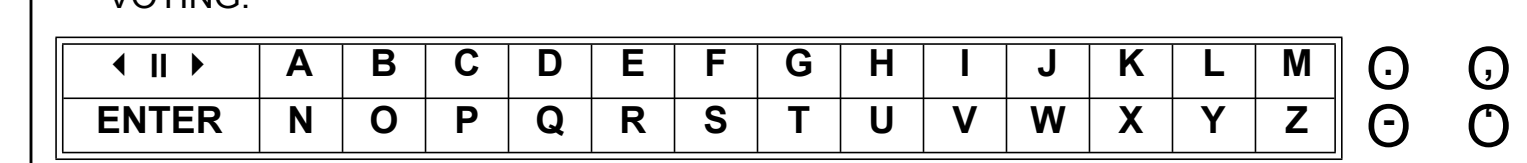
